During the first 6 months of 2003, the Nation experienced a 3.1-percent decrease in violent crime and a 0.8-percent decrease in property crime when compared with data submitted for the first 6 months of 2002. Violent crimes include murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault. Property crimes include burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft. Although arson is not included in the property crime total, data showed that the number of arson offenses decreased 10.0 percent when comparing the number reported for the first 6 months of 2003 to that for the first 6 months of 2002.

Table 1 shows the percent change in offenses reported to law enforcement by population group during the period examined. The percent change by geographic region is shown in Table 2. The percent change reflected in Table 3 is for consecutive years from 1999-2003. Table 4 presents 2002 and 2003 data submitted by agencies having resident populations of 100,000 and over. All data in this report are preliminary and are based on the number of offenses reported to law enforcement agencies providing 3 to 6 comparable months of data January through June 2002 and 2003.

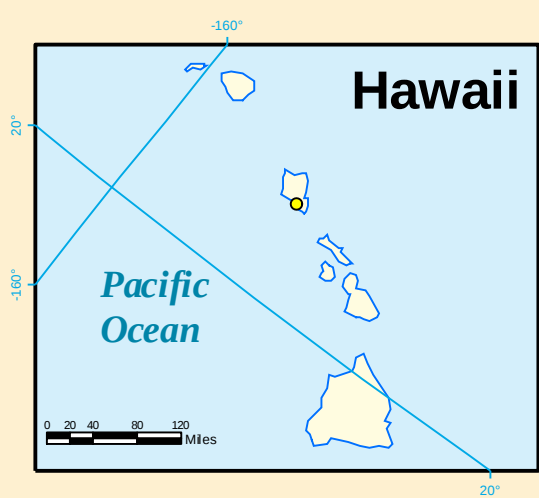

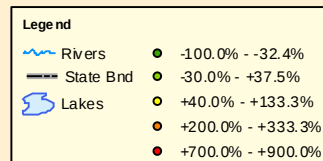
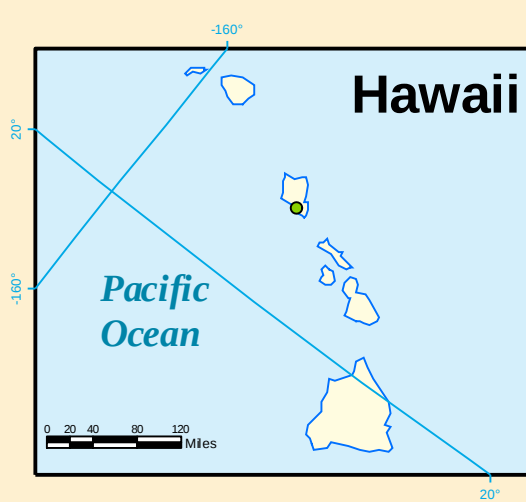


Percent Change in Reported Violent Crimes

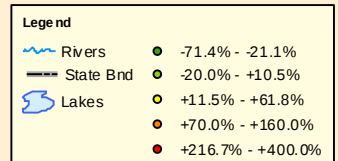

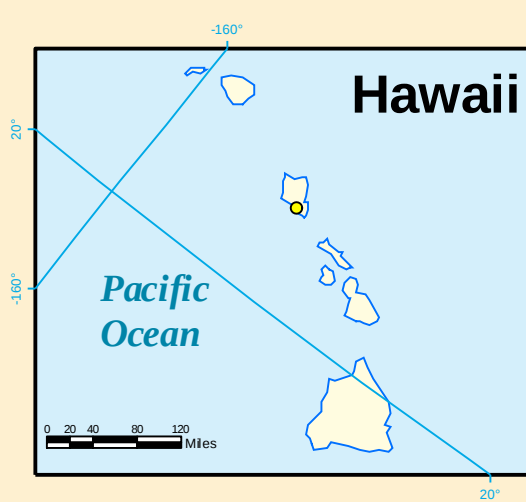

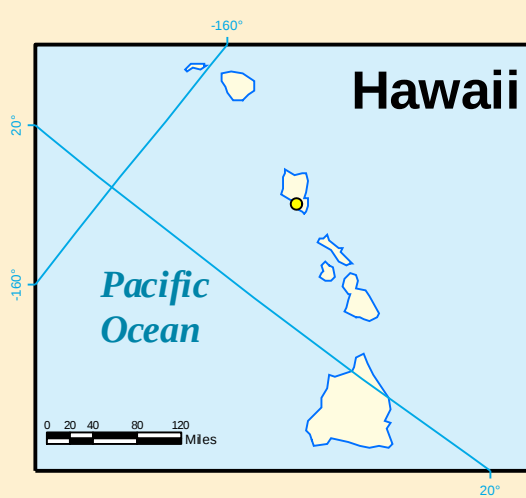

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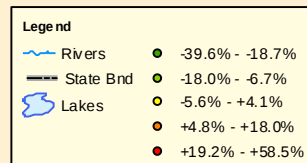
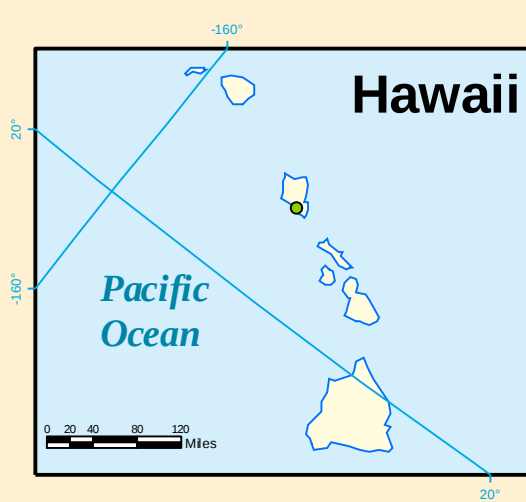


Percent Change in Reported Property Crimes

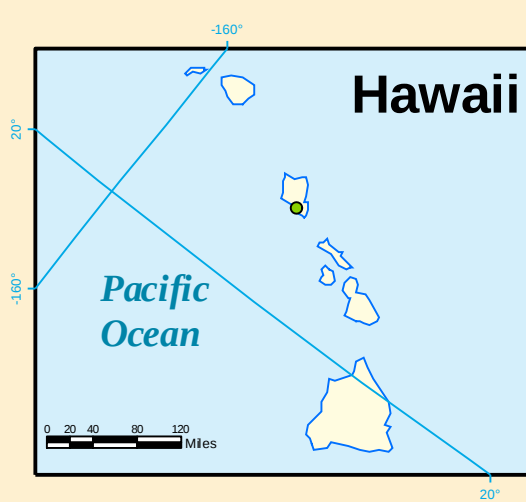

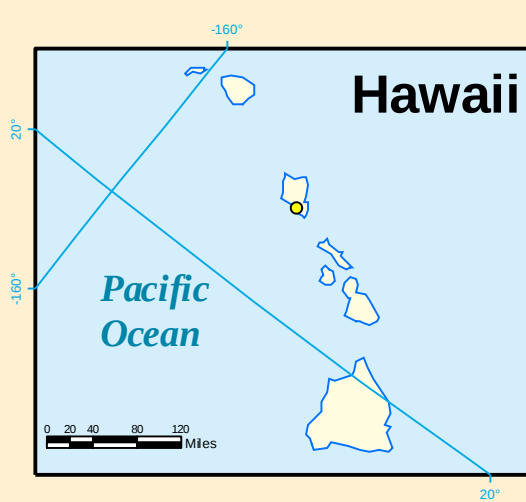


Percent Change in Reported Larceny-thefts

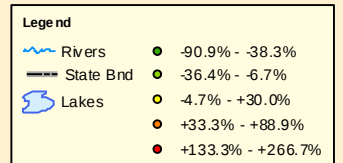
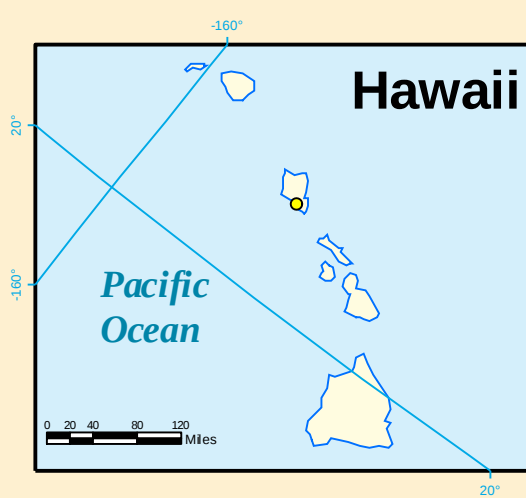


Percent Change in Reported Motor Vehicle Thefts

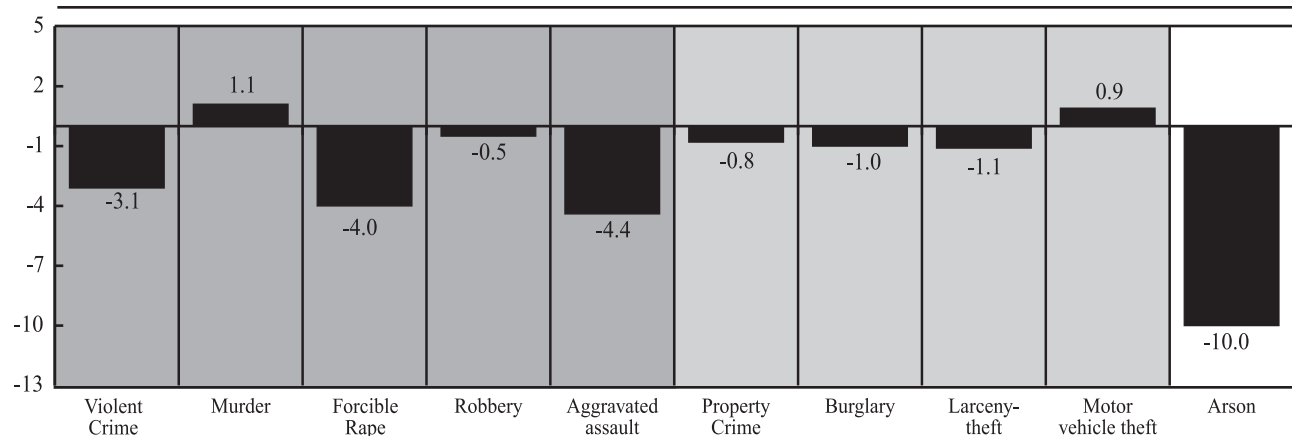

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PLEASE NOTE

Figures used in this report are submitted voluntarily by law enforcement agencies throughout the country. Individuals using these tabulations are cautioned against drawing conclusions by making direct comparisons between cities because many factors affect the amount and type of crime from place to place. Some of these factors are listed in the annual publication *Crime in the United States*. More valid use can be made of these figures by determining deviations from national averages and by comparing averages for cities in similar population groups (Table 1). It is important to remember that crime is a social problem and, therefore, a concern of the entire community. The efforts of law enforcement are limited to factors within its control. Data users can obtain assistance by calling (304) 625-4995.

Data users are cautioned against comparing crime trends presented in this report with those estimated by the National Crime Victimization Survey (NCVS), administered by the Bureau of Justice Statistics. Because of differences in methodology and crime coverage, the two programs examine the Nation's crime problem from somewhat different perspectives, and their results are not strictly comparable. The definitional and procedural differences can account for many of the apparent discrepancies in results. The Department of Justice's fact sheet, *The Nation's Two Crime Measures*, contains a detailed description of the NCVS and Uniform Crime Reports.
